whether you rock the leather or textiles. That stuff could most likely use a good cleaning and retreatment so that the "liquid sunshine" stays on the outside. The same thing goes with your boots. If you are rolling around with cold wet feet then the only thing on your mind is the fact that your feet are cold and wet. While you are at it, don't neglect the trusty scooter.

Are all of the lights up to snuff? When it's dark out I want to have my lighting systems working at maximum potential. We disappear into the visual cacophony easily enough in the best conditions, but when visibility goes down we are at even more risk.

What do your brakes look like? In wet conditions, brake performance decreases (news flash), and older pads lose their grip. Maybe it's time to swap them out for some grippier ones so that they will actually do their job.

Finally, how are the tires? Older tires tend to lose their grip just due to age, and tires that have been pushed through repeated heat cycles (Translation: Ride it like you stole it) will also harden up. Just when you need it your traction is diminished. Even if there is a ton of tread left to move the water out of the contact patch if the contact patch cannot get a good grip on the cold road you are limiting what you can safely do.

If you're ready for it the foul weather months don't have to be a total misery. As a side note, I have a new Gore-Tex riding suit and boots that I need to check out, so bring on the waterworks.



What is an Outlaw Motorcycle Gang? And who is an Outlaw Motorcycle Gang Member?

Law enforcement is pretty casual about referring to clubs (or even groups of riders) as OMGs (outlaw motorcycle gangs).

But what is an "outlaw motorcycle gang" under Washington law?

> A gang is a group of three or more people with a common name, sign or symbol that have the commission of criminal acts as one of the primary activities. RCW 9.94.030(12).

Even though law enforcement uses the term OMG as liberally as Bobby Knight uses profanity, we think that law enforcement would be hard-pressed to establish that any motorcycle club engages in criminal acts as one of its primary activities.

Do motorcycle clubs engage in criminal activities? No question. So does every other group with three or more members that uses a common name, sign or symbol. Churches? Check. Corporations? Check. Government agencies and subdivisions? Check.

[An interesting exception: bona fide nonprofits are definitionally not gangs.]

How is primary used in the law? Is your primary residence the one at which you spend the most time? So if time is the unit of measure, do clubs spend the majority of their time riding or doing something else?

There's also the question of whether an individual is a "gang member" if they belong to a club that engages in criminal behavior. Can the actions of a few be used to define an entire group?

Here's the legal definition

A member (or associate) is any person who actively participates in any criminal street gang and who

intentionally promotes, furthers or assists in any criminal act by the criminal street gang. RCW 9.94.030(13).

It's pretty clear that just because you're a member of an organization that you can't be considered a gang member (without some other form of involvement)

So what's the solution? We think these issues are ripe for a lawsuit. Probably the best "test" case would be where law enforcement refers to a club that clearly isn't a gang as an OMG or a law-abiding brother as a gang member

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Failing to Yield and Finding Coverage for Injured Riders

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Washington State Patrol's PSA

Washington State Patrol recently issued a reminder to drivers to be aware of motorcyclists following an uptick in recent motorcycle crashes.

WSP explained that an overwhelming majority of motorcycle wrecks involve drivers failing to see motorcycles.

WSP's reminder was a nice PSA but we've known for a long time that drivers often fail to notice motorcycles.

Drivers Failing to Yield to Motorcycles

A lot of motorcycle wrecks are caused by the other driver failing to yield. Frequently these drivers are entering the highway from a private road or driveway.

Here's the law:


The driver of a vehicle about to enter or cross a highway from a private road or driveway shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles lawfully approaching on said

Some of these wrecks are entirely the result of driver inattention. But most are the result of several factors

The Sight Triangle and Finding Coverage for Injured Riders

Unless the at-fault driver has millions of dollars of insurance, it usually makes sense to investigate whether there were other factors (besides driver error) involved and other sources of coverage (besides the at-fault driver's liability insurance) available

There's something called the "sight triangle" that refers to a driver's ability to see oncoming traffic. Clear sight friangles are areas next to intersections and driveways where a driver needs to be able to see when turning. Areas within clear sight triangles must be kept free from obstructions. More than 70 percent of drivers in Washington are underinsured. Some don't have any insurance. Many don't have enough.

The minimum liability limits in Washington are \$25,000 per person and \$50,000 per accident. They haven't been raised since the 1980s.

Here's some basic but important information about the main types of insurance coverage

Liability Insurance

In the last couple years Washington law changed. Liability insurance is now required for motorcycle riders.

Your auto policy won't provide coverage for you when you're riding your motorcycle. You need to purchase a motorcycle-specific policy.

The law only requires \$25,000 in coverage But that's grossly inadequate. The minir you need is \$1,000,000.

That's what you need to protect your assets. That's what you need to make sure that there's enough money to pay for someone else's care. That's what you need for yourself if you get hit by an underinsured driver

Purpose/Benefits of Motorcycle Liability Coverage

It's pretty rare that collisions with motorcycles cause injuries to occupants of cars or trucks.

But passengers and pedestrians are rable

(If you get into a wreck that's your fault, passengers and pedestrians can make claims against you.)

Buying liability insurance puts you on the right side of the law. It also has several other benefits.

1. Liability coverage provides asset protection. (But you have to buy enough coverage. More on that below.)

2. Liability coverage provides money for 2: Liability Coverage provides money for friends and family who get hurt because you made a mistake. Everyone makes mistakes. Who are we most likely to hurt? The people we care most about: passengers riding on the back of the maximum section. motorcycle, friends riding next to us in the pack, etc.

3. Liability coverage is kind of like the golden ticket: It allows you to purchase uninsured motorist (UM) and underinsured motorist (UIM) coverage. In Washington you can only purchase UM/UIM coverage if you have liability insurance and can only purchase UM/UIM up to the same amount of your liability coverage. If you're riding a motorcycle, UM/UIM is the most important kind of coverage to have.

Personal Umbrella Protection
